# **Ruse Burglaries**

The Streamwood Police Department has received reports of residential burglaries where the offenders are posing as utility or other construction workers. One offender will come up to a house, trying to convince a resident that they need help to check an electrical, water, or similar property issue. Once the offender has the resident distracted, another enters the home and removes items of value from bedrooms and offices. Cash and jewelry are the most common targets, with the elderly being the most victimized. The offenders usually wear clothing and/or hats that would represent them as utility workers or contractors. They will frequently use a phone or walkie-talkie during the burglary and speak or act as if talking to another person with the company they are posing to work for. The Streamwood Police Department recommends that residents **DO NOT** allow unknown and unsolicited visitors into their homes; talk through a locked door to anyone you weren't expecting; and verify employment by calling the agency they claim to work for. If at any time residents encounter a similar scenario, they should immediately call 911.

# **New Village Trustee Appointed**

At the March 7 Village Board meeting, Jovandi Bermudez was sworn in to fill the vacant Trustee position due to Bill Harper's resignation. When a Board position becomes vacated, the Village solicits applications from the community and provides everyone an opportunity to be considered. Twenty-one applications were received

for this vacancy! The Village Board members interviewed everyone. Mr. Bermudez was selected by Board vote to fill the remaining term. He has been a resident of Streamwood for over 10 years and is a real estate managing broker.

# **Bike And Pedestrian Bridge Project**



The Village has been working since 2019 on the implementation of a bicycle and pedestrian bridge over Route 59. Our Comprehensive Plan called for improved connectivity in our community through the expansion of our bike and pedestrian path system. The Village has been diligently working to realize this vision. This spring we started work on the project. The initial work includes site prep, utility work and installing foundations for the boardwalk. Work also includes boardwalks through the wetlands, connecting with a steel truss bridge over Route 59. The boardwalks will tie into the existing path system on the west side of Route 59. Due to the steel material lead time, the prefabricated steel bridge portion of the project over Route 59 is anticipated to start in April of 2025 and be complete in July of 2025. The Village will also be working to install a path along Madison Drive to connect with the boardwalks, park and path system along Irving Park Road. The project is a joint effort with support from multiple agencies including the Village of Streamwood and funding from the Federal government, the Illinois Department of Transportation, and Cook County. The DARE program that has been taught for over 30 years in the village, by the Streamwood Police Department, will celebrate the graduation of almost 250 fifth grade students in May. The DARE program focuses on self-esteem and current topics like bullying and online safety, as well as informing the students how dangerous drugs can be. The DARE program also instructed over 300 first grade students this semester. The topics include the importance of knowing your address, 911, strangers, street sign safety, safe foods, and trusting persons in authority. # **A New Gateway To Our Community**



An exciting new community open space is coming to Streamwood! The Village has taken over the care and maintenance of Kollar Pond (55 E Irving Park Road), and has some exciting plans for the 8-acre space. Kollar Pond is adjacent to the Village Hall and Police Station. Our Comprehensive Plan envisioned making this space part of our overall municipal campus. Working with consultants, the space has been reimagined as a unique and timeless destination; a vibrant new gathering space and gateway to Streamwood that the whole family can enjoy.

The Village shared the design concepts with the community at two open houses in March and April. Project team members discussed design concepts, answered questions, and heard community input. The reenvisioned space will include walking paths, improved water management and access, interactive design elements, and is intended to become an iconic gateway to our community. We hope to initiate this multi-year plan in 2025.

# **Business Assistance Grant Program**

The business assistance program offers grants, up to a maximum of \$25,000, for sales tax producing businesses uses including retail establishments and restaurants. Grants require pre-approval before any eligible work commences. Funding, if approved, will be distributed on a reimbursement basis once a project is substantially completed. Building owners or lessees (with written consent from the building owner) are eligible to apply. The program was recently amended and now applies to all non-residential properties Village-wide. The amount of incentive granted will vary based upon the improvements made and each application will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis. All improvements must conform to the Village's regulations including, but not limited to,

the Zoning Ordinance and Building Codes, which are available on our website. Individual properties will be eligible for grants, regardless of who the current tenant may be, once every two fiscal years. The Village of Streamwood uses a calendar year budget (January-December). # **2024 Walking Inspections Program**

The Village will begin conducting its annual Walking Inspections Program in June. Code Enforcement Inspectors will be checking for exterior property maintenance items such as tall grass/weeds, home condition (roof, siding, gutters, windows, paint), excess exterior storage, and improperly stored refuse containers. The following streets are scheduled for inspection: Ascot Ln, Beverly Ln, Beverly Ct, Canterbury Ct, Chaucer Ln, Chrisman Dr, Cottonwood Dr, English Oak Ln, Fallstone Dr, Jackson Ln, Lisa Ln, Nettle Ln, Osprey Ct, E Shag Bark Ln, Sunset Cr, Tilia Ct, Washington Ave, Washington Ct, Wildflower Wy, Willow Ct, and Willow Rd. # **Parking**

Between the hours of 1:00 am - 5:00 am, parking is prohibited on Village streets, except where noted in specific subdivisions. Blocking the sidewalk with a vehicle is prohibited from March 1 through November 30. Vehicles parked in residential driveways CANNOT block the sidewalk or parkway between the hours of 7:00 am - 9:00 pm, Monday through Friday; and 9:00 am - 9:00 pm, Saturday and Sunday. Questions? # **Thinking About Home Projects?**

So many home projects and repairs get started as the weather warms up. Be sure to check if your home improvement project requires a permit. Having projects reviewed and inspected is the best way to avoid conditions that could adversely affect the health and safety of you, your family and/or neighbors. Inspections also help protect your investment. Common projects, like installing sheds or fences, repairing or replacing a roof, windows, or siding, are simple to apply for and permits are typically obtained quickly. The Community Development Department is ready to help you with the application process for whatever type of work you are planning.

# **Remove Invasive Species From Your Landscape**

One (1) out of three (3) plants in Illinois woodlands, wetlands, and grasslands are non-native. Plant invasions can cause economic damage, displace native species, alter ecosystem functions, and interfere with ecological restoration goals. The Public Works landscape department spends a lot of time removing invasive species, while planting/seeding to help restore native plant communities. Native plants are easier to grow and provide food and shelter for pollinators and other wildlife. One example of a plant that should be removed is the Buckthorn. It can be found in gardens and yards in the Midwest but should be removed. Under the Illinois Exotic Weed Act, Buckthorn cannot be sold in our state. Buckthorn berries and seeds are spread by birds. The seeds geminate at a very high rate and remain viable in the soil for 2-3 years, degrading natural communities. Help us remove invasive species from our neighborhoods. # **Summer Safety Tips**

The Streamwood Fire Department would like you to keep these tips in mind as you enjoy the summer with family and neighbors:

- Outdoor fires: fire pits, fireplaces, and chimineas should be at least 10 feet from your home, shed, and trees; make sure the fire is completely extinguished when left unattended; do not move your portable fireplace into the garage, near the house, or under the deck until it's completely extinguished and allowed to cool for at 24 hours.
- Grilling: Grills are for outdoor use only! Indoor use (even in the garage with the
  door open) can cause a fire and carbon monoxide poisoning; grills should be well
  away from your siding, deck railings, and not used on a balcony; keep them out
  from under eaves and hanging branches.
- Fireworks: Even legal, consumer-grade fireworks can cause serious burns; legal sparklers reach temperatures of 1,200 F; leave fireworks to the professionals!
- Swimming: Never leave children unattended in or near pools, hot tubs, and other bodies of water; always walk, don't run, around the pool!
- Cycling: Children and adults should always wear a bike helmet and have reflectors on their bicycles.
- Weather: When thunder roars, go indoors! If you can hear thunder, you are
  close enough to be struck by lightning; the safest place to be during a storm is
  inside a stable structure and away from windows.

# Fireworks Are Dangerous And Illegal

The possession, sale, use or discharge of any firework is Illegal in Illinois and in Streamwood. The use of fireworks is dangerous and can result in several unintended consequences such as serious injuries or death and starting uncontrolled fires. The noise caused by fireworks can be very disturbing to many people and pets in our community. Everyone is being asked to be good neighbors and follow the State Laws and our Local Ordinances regarding illegal fireworks this season. Streamwood Police Officers will be actively enforcing the State Law and Local Ordinances: **State Law** (425 ILCS 35/2) — *it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, co-partnership, or corporation to knowingly possess, offer for sale, expose for sale, sell at retail, or use or explode any display fireworks, flame effects, or consumer fireworks; Streamwood Local Ordinance (Section 6-4-2) — <i>possession; sale and or discharge of fireworks no person, firm, partnership or corporation shall possess, offer for sale, expose for sale, sell at retail, keep with intent to sell at retail, use or explode any fireworks. The fire chief, police chief or their designees are authorized to confiscate, seize, take, remove or cause to be removed at the expense of the owner all stocks of fireworks or combustibles possessed, used, offered, exposed for sale, stored or held in violation of this chapter. Please call 911 to report illegal activity and fireworks violations as they are happening; an officer will be dispatched to the area.*



# Register For 2024-25 School Year Before May 31



# **Branch Pickup**

Public Works will collect branches, free of charge, from your curbside during designated collection days. Simply place branches at the curb by 6:00 am on the day your area is scheduled for pickup. It is important to have your branches out by the scheduled morning listed below to avoid being missed by the branch pickup crews. Crews collect branches as



soon as possible but cannot be expected to return if branches are not out in time. Branches must be placed with the cut ends facing the street. Branches cannot be longer than ten feet (10') in length and have a diameter of no larger than six inches (6"). The Village is divided into four areas for pickup service (see map). Each area receives branch pickup service once per month.

Crews try to collect branches as soon as possible. It usually takes more than one day to collect all branches in each area; however, the branches must be at the curb by 6:00 am on the first day your area is scheduled for pickup.
