Parkway Tree Program

Our 50/50 Parkway Tree Program lets you purchase trees for the parkway at a significant savings. Pay 50% of the cost of the tree, the Village pays the rest and takes care of the installation. Tree planting on private property is also available, when purchased through this program. Starting prices for trees in the parkway are \$125 and \$250 for trees on private property. No Increase in Water Rate for 2021

Water and sewer rates are established to provide the necessary funding for the purchase of water and long-term maintenance of our infrastructure. The Village Board confirmed there will be no increase to the rate for 2021. This is evidence of our commitment to provide high quality services, in the most cost efficient manner possible.





Village of Streamwood - 2021 Budget Summary

Fiscal Responsibility

Recently, the Village of Streamwood adopted its 2021 Budget. Once again, the Budget is balanced with no new fees or taxes. Water rates will remain frozen through the end of 2021. Due to COVID-19, the Village had to take a hard look at every line item of its budget. The Village has estimated that our community has lost revenues totaling \$1 million. For those items that were not contractually obligated, the Village's 2021 Budget remained flat with the prior year. The majority of the Village's General Fund expenditures (82.1%) are based on our commitment to our core services (Police, Fire, and Public Works).

Investing in Our Community

In 2018, the Village initiated a detailed multi-year plan to improve our public facilities. Village Hall and Streamwood Oaks Golf Club House were renovated in 2019. In 2020 and 2021, construction commenced on Fire Station #31 (Park Avenue) as well as the Public Works Facility (Bartlett Road). All of these projects are included in the Village's Comprehensive Plan which is focused on reinvesting in our community. By managing its resources effectively, Streamwood is able to perform these projects without impacting Village taxpayers. The Village has also allocated resources for Community Event Signs and the continued development of a Village-wide Bike Pathway System. In addition, Streamwood has a strong commitment to reconstructing or resurfacing 6 miles of streets annually. With over 99 miles of streets in the community, a high priority of the Village Board is to maintain this critical infrastructure. The 2021 Budget includes improvements to Romajean, Pine, Poplar, Spruce, Laurel, Whispering, Brookside, Sunnydale, Audubon and Park Boulevard, between Irving Park and Schaumburg Road.



Where do your property tax dollars ao?

The Village of Streamwood received \$12.1 million in 2020 from property taxes or roughly 13 cents of every property tax dollar. The largest portion of an average

property tax bill is directed to School District U-46, which receives over 60% of every property tax dollar. For the Village, property taxes are an essential revenue source and utilized to fund essential services including Police and Fire (Public Safety), Public Works, and Capital Projects which include street improvements. As a result, exceptional services are offered in an efficient and cost effective manner.

Budget and Tax Levy Approved

On December 3, the Village Board adopted its 2021

Operating and Capital Improvements Budget.

Despite the pandemic, the Village ended the year with a small surplus. Every attempt was made to hold the



economic activity due to the continuation of the pandemic into 2021. At \$77,096,717, the 2021 Budget is balanced, and includes a number of items intended to realize our buildable Comprehensive Plan, such as completion to the Fire Station project, improving bike and walking trails, including the design for a bridge over Route 59, and our annual road program; all with no new taxes or fees.

As part of the budget process, the Village Board adopted the **2020 Tax Levy**. The levy was decreased by 0.1% as a result of favorable returns on our debt service. And, the Village Board held steady the **2021 Sewer and Water Rate**. To view the entire 2021 Budget, we encourage you to visit our website at www.streamwood.org.

Be a Good Neighbor!

Over the past few years, the Village has worked to better define, control, and regulate noises that generate the most resident and business complaints. Dealing with unreasonable loud noise is a quality of life issue that unfortunately needs to be addressed by the police department from time to time. The Noise Control Regulation ordinance gives the police department the tools to regulate the noise issues, which attract the most complaints from our residents and businesses.

The most typical type of complaints in residential areas includes loud music (including from a vehicle), late-night parties, yelling, and shouting. Concerns in business areas include excessive amplified sounds, garbage collection, and loading and unloading. The noise ordinance sets specific hours in which loud noises will be tolerated. In general, no construction, loud music, garbage collection, loading and unloading will be permitted between the hours of 10:00 pm and 7:00 am, on weekdays, and between 10:00 pm and 10:00 am on the weekends. This includes amplification which can be heard at a distance of one hundred feet (100') from the point of its origin. Music from a vehicle may not be heard from beyond seventy-five feet (75') away.

These regulations do provide some exemptions. School and park events, certain construction efforts, and public works projects may generate noises earlier or later than the prescribed hours. Of course, emergency repairs or emergency vehicles are also exempt from these regulations. This ordinance will


We Want Your Input!

The Village Board recently adopted our 2021 Budget. We again adopted a balanced budget that is focused on maintaining all levels of services, working on realizing our Comprehensive Plan, and

One of the projects we are working on includes the opportunity to build a trail bridge over Route 59. We are in the preliminary engineering and design stages. We welcome residents input. A public forum is being planned for February 25. Please keep an eye on our website for further details and information.

We hope that you enjoyed your entire holiday season, even though it was very different. We tried to get it off to a great start with Luminaria. This event was impacted by the pandemic. But, residents, families, businesses and civic groups still came out to enjoy our annual event on December 4. They filled bags and lit the luminaria along Park Blvd. Some drove by the Village Hall, Veterans Memorial and Police Station, which were decorated in thousands of colorful lights. On behalf of the Village Board of Trustees, I would like to express our sincere appreciation to all those who helped to continue this unique tradition in Streamwood, despite the changes required under COVID-19.

Protect Our Water Supply – Reduce Rock Salt Use

The Village encourages residents to use rock salt with care to protect our water supply. After melting snow and ice, the salty slush drains into sewers and washes into rivers. Once in the water, it chokes aquatic life and changes the composition of our region's streams and lakes. After shoveling, please limit the use of salt on driveways and sidewalks. Excess salt should be swept up and thrown away to avoid damaging grass, trees, or our waterways.

Holiday Lights Recycling Program

There is still time to recycle broken and unused holiday lights! As you put away your holiday decorations, please don't throw unwanted lights in the trash. Containers are located at Village Hall, Public Works, Poplar Creek Library, and Park Place Recreation Center. All types of stringed lights and extension cords are accepted. Snow Plow Routes Information

The Public Works Department works hard to keep our streets clear throughout any storm event. Please remember not to park on streets after a 2" or greater snowfall to allow the plows to do their job. To decrease excessive snow at the end of your driveway, try to shovel in the direction of traffic, starting with a small clear space along the curb line and at the end of your driveway. If a plow inadvertently hits your mailbox, or causes other damage, please report it immediately by calling 630-736-3850 or 911.

Please note that the Village does not plow IDOT or Cook County roads. IDOT is responsible for plowing

Barrington Road, Irving Park Road, Lake Street, and Route 59. For questions on IDOT roads, please call 800-452-4368. Cook County Highway Department maintains Schaumburg, Bartlett and Bode Roads. For questions on County roads, please call 847-603-1600.



School District U-46

School District U-49 Covid-19 Update

While COVID-19 metrics have improved slightly, Illinois Department of Public Health continues to see positivity rates in excess of 8%. Additionally, both state and local health departments still anticipate surges in cases following the holidays. As a result, School District U-46 has decided to delay hybrid and additional in-person learning until after the New Year. The plan for learning by grade is as follows:

Pre-K to 2nd Grade - Students remain in distance learning with their current teachers. Students will return for in-person hybrid instruction the week of January 11, 2021.

3rd Grade to 6th Grade - Students remain in distance learning with their current teachers. Any necessary re-assignments will occur when schools start in-person instruction under the hybrid model the week of January 11.

Middle and High Schools - Students will remain in distance learning following their current schedules. The schedule for hybrid model for in-person instruction will begin when students return for the second semester beginning January 19, 2021. Schedules were sent to all middle and high school families. The District has developed plans to provide some level of support for struggling students before the first semester ends, with targeted opportunities for small group in-person instruction from January 4-15.

Specialized Student Services - Students in transition and/or self-contained specialized student services programs, will return for in-person instruction beginning January 11.

The development and distribution of a vaccine for COVID-19 is great news. It provides hope that the school year may soon return to a greater sense of normal. The District will continue to review and modify its schedule to ensure the safety and health of all its students, teachers, and support staff.
