# Fire Station 31 Is Open For Service!

The Village is very excited to open the new and improved Fire Station 31 at Park and Cambridge Avenues. The original station on the site was approved for construction in 1972 and opened for use in 1973. This station served as fire department headquarters as the organization grew from a handful of volunteers to the full-service department the Village offers today. Fifty years later, we are proud to open the renovated Fire Station 31, which was activated to service on April 1, 2021.

The new fire station has four apparatus bays and will house active and reserve apparatus, along with associated support equipment. The new building was designed to promote workforce safety and diversity, and the site includes space for firefighters to train while on duty. A three-level section on the south end of the station is reminiscent of the original training tower of the former station. Components from the original building have been incorporated into the new one including the brass fire pole which remains operational. Firefighters will utilize a new classroom for daily training, and the room will also allow opportunities for public gatherings. Once again, Station 31 will serve as the headquarters for the department, which had relocated to Station 33 on Schaumburg Road in 1992.

While COVID protocols prohibited a formal, opening celebration, the Village is hopeful that this fall will permit an Open House where the new station can be toured and enjoyed by the community.

# **And the Survey Says!**

On February 25, the Village held a community forum to gather input on the proposed Bridge and Trail Project for the Route 59 Corridor. Over 30 people attended the forum and provided input on design options and path location. The Village also had an online survey to gather input from those who might not have been able to make the meeting.

Over 250 people provided comments. Most respondents (224) were Village residents. Most said they would use the path and bridge for recreation (81%). Only 6% saying they would not use the system at all. It was clear there were representatives from throughout the community as respondents had equal distribution on how they would access the path with 28% from the east (including from Madison), 17% from the west, 22% from the north, and 25% from the south along Sutton Road.

Two overall design concepts were offered, along with various project design elements. Most respondents favored "Bridge Concept #1" preferring traditional piers and higher, sheltered railings. Most respondents talked about clean lines and making sure the bridge blends into the surrounding areas. Enclosed railing treatment for the boardwalks and seating areas that are integrated, but outside of trail traffic patterns, were also preferred.

There was significant support for opportunities for accessing and making transitions to the path, but also being conscientious to the surrounding residential areas. Most people wanted the Village to focus on sustainable materials that are longer-lasting, to help keep long-term maintenance costs down. A consistent theme was safety and sustainability should be primary to any final design selections.

Ninety-five (95) respondents offered additional comments. The vast majority of which were positive (92%). Eight comments did express concerns about costs and use of this facility. It has been noted that the Village is actively seeking grant funding for this project and has been saving for improvements in our capital fund. Most believe this to be an exciting project that will make it safer for bicyclists, pedestrians, children, and families to cross Route 59, as well as providing connectivity to surrounding destinations.

Thank you to everyone who took the time and offered input. The information provided was both practical and creative. The Village will use this information as we continue to make progress on this engineering design phase. We plan to host another forum in the fall. #### **Parking**


Between the hours of 1:00 am - 5:00 am, parking is prohibited on Village streets, except where noted in specific subdivisions. Blocking the sidewalk with a vehicle is prohibited from March 1 through November 30. Vehicles parked in residential driveways CANNOT block the sidewalk or parkway between the hours of 7:00 am - 9:00 pm, Monday through Friday; and 9:00 am - 9:00 pm, Saturday and Sunday. Questions? # A Reminder That Fireworks Are Illegal in Illinois!

It is presumed that the many American traditions of parades and community fireworks to celebrate our nation's birthday will be canceled again this year due to COVID-19. However, fireworks at home can turn a joyful celebration into a painful memory when children and adults are injured or killed, or houses and businesses catch fire. Fireworks are dangerous and illegal.

On average, 180 people go to the emergency room every day with fireworks-related injuries during the month around the July 4th holiday. The Pyrotechnic Use Act ("PUA") in Illinois bans the



sale, possession, and use of all "consumer fireworks." The items you can legally purchase in other states, like firecrackers, bottle rockets and roman candles are a violation of the Village of Streamwood Local Ordinance, subject to fines of up to \$750 and Illinois State Law, subject to misdemeanor arrest. Offenders can be challenging to catch. Please call 911 to report illegal activity and fireworks violations as they are happening; an officer will be dispatched to the area. In addition, fireworks set off randomly anywhere, at any time of the day or night can be the worst triggers for those suffering with PTSD; the earth-shaking booms disrupt neighborhoods and terrify pets and small children. Be a considerate neighbor — do not use illegal fireworks!



# **Branch Pickup**

Through October, Public Works will collect branches, free of charge, from your curbside during designated collection days. Simply place branches at the curb by 6:00 am on the day your area is scheduled for pickup. It is important to have your branches out by the scheduled morning listed below

in order to avoid being missed by the branch pickup crews. Crews collect branches as soon as possible but cannot be expected to return if branches are not out in time.

Branches must be placed with the cut ends facing the street. Branches cannot be longer than ten feet (10') in length, and have a diameter of no larger than six (6) inches.



The Village is divided into four areas for pickup service (see map). Each area receives branch pickup service one time per month.
