At the August 18 Village Board meeting, graduates of the Streamwood Police Department's 2nd annual Junior Citizens Police Academy were recognized for their participation.

During the week of July 11 through July 15, the police department had the privilege to host twenty-eight 6-8th grade students, as they learned what a police officer's



job entails. #### **Refuse Container Placement and Collection**

Residential refuse and recycling containers, when not placed at the curb during authorized times for collection, may only be stored inside the garage or on the side (or rear) of the exterior of the residence/garage. The containers may be placed at the curb for collection no earlier than 5:00 pm the day before scheduled pickup. The empty containers must be removed from the curb and properly stored by 9:00 pm on the day of scheduled pickup.

#### Outdoor Fireplaces — Enjoy Them Safely!

As the weather cools down, people enjoy sitting around the warmth and light of a backyard fire. When used properly, a fire offers a relaxing setting for conversation and socialization. But when used improperly, it can cause serious injury or death. The Streamwood Fire Department offers the following tips to keep your backyard fireplace safe:

- Outdoor fireplaces must have a lid or screen to contain all embers or sparks; use without violates Village Ordinance
- Burn only dry, unpainted/unfinished wood; it is illegal to burn leaves, paper, cardboard, and garbage
- Place the fireplace on a non-combustible, flat surface, away from buildings and vegetation
- Keep children a good distance away and always have a responsible adult supervise when in use
- Have a fire extinguisher or water source available in case of an emergency
- Use of an outdoor fireplace/fire pit is prohibited between the hours of 12:00 am - 6:00 am
- Please use the fire pit with sensitivity to neighbors that may have health conditions or wish to have windows open in their homes; the generation of excessive smoke is considered a public nuisance

Please use common sense. Respect your neighbors. Be aware of smoke travel, wind speed and direction, and plan accordingly. When used improperly, a backyard fireplace can be both illegal and deadly. If you have any questions, please contact the Fire Department at 630-736-3650.

Please do not rake, sweep or blow leaves into the street. All yard waste must be placed into approved containers for collection by Groot Industries.





#### Help Us Keep Our Natural Areas Thriving

The Village of Streamwood is proud of its long history of protecting and preserving our natural resources. #### **Fire Extinguisher Safety Tips**

A portable fire extinguisher can save lives and property by putting out a small fire or containing it until the fire department arrives. Fire extinguishers are great tools but have their limitations. Some considerations with home fire extinguishers:

- Assure you have working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors in your home
- Before attacking a fire with an extinguisher, assure that 9-1-1 has been called and everyone else has safely exited the building
- Use a fire extinguisher when a fire is contained to a small area, such as a stove-top or garbage can if the fire begins to grow, it's time to exit the building
- If you do extinguish the fire, still call 9-1-1 so the fire department can check to be sure it is out; if not completely extinguished, a small smoldering ember can 'rekindle' and cause another fire hours later

Learn to operate a fire extinguisher before it's time to use it! Remember P-A-S-S: Pull the pin and grip the handle; Aim low, point the extinguisher at the base of the fire to put out what's burning (don't aim into the middle of the flames); Squeeze the handle-lever slowly; and Sweep the nozzle from side to side, aiming at the base of the fire.

For the home, choose a multi-purpose (A-B-C) fire extinguisher. A small extinguisher is okay and makes it easy to mount, store, and use. Children should not be

trained how to operate portable fire extinguishers. Children should get out, stay out, and call 9-1-1 if there is a fire. Be sure to inspect your fire extinguisher often. Make sure the pressure gauge is ok and the extinguisher is easily accessible.

How do you know if your fire extinguisher needs to be replaced? Pressure gauge is in the yellow or red; external damage such as a cracked hose or broken handle; over 10 years old; and/or has been used before (even if only used a little bit, most home fire extinguishers cannot be reused later).

How to dispose of an old fire extinguisher? The fire department does not accept fire extinguishers. Empty, fully-used fire extinguishers can be disposed of in the regular trash. If your extinguisher still has some powder inside, it should be disposed of at a hazardous waste disposal facility. The closest facility is the Household Hazardous Waste Facility located at 156 Fort Hill Road in Naperville. Their hours of operation are Saturday and Sunday from 9:00 am - 2:00 pm. This facility is open to all Illinois residents, free, and there are no appointments necessary. #### **School District U-46**

#### **Building Tours Offered As Part Of Unite U-46**

School District U-46 is urging all community members within the district boundaries — whether they have children in U-46 schools or not — to take part in at least one of three Unite U-46 events scheduled for September.



Unite U-46 is a community engagement initiative that seeks to develop recommendations on the best way to implement the long-range vision of the Board of Education; this vision includes shifting middle school to include grades 6-8 (the current model has 6th grade as part of elementary school); using the space in elementary schools to expand early childhood opportunities across U-46; and to replace and/or renovate some of our older buildings to provide equitable access to learning environments that support academic success for all.

The next Unite U-46 session is Wednesday, September 14 at 7:00 pm. It will focus on how school building improvements are funded, and the options for moving the process forward. In addition, there will be a tour of select school buildings on Saturday, September 24 from 9:00 am to noon, and an open house on Thursday, September 29 from 5:00 pm to 8:00 pm. The tour and open house will allow attendees to see first-hand how aging facilities, enrollment challenges, and the changing needs of our students are impacting everyday learning experiences. 

# Branch Pickup — Ends In October!

Public Works
will collect
branches, free
of charge, from
your curbside
during designated
collection
days. Simply



place branches at the curb by 6:00 am on the day your area is scheduled for pickup. It is important to have your branches out by the scheduled morning listed below in order to avoid being missed by the branch pickup crews. Crews collect branches as soon as possible but cannot be expected to return if branches are not out in time.

Branches must be placed with the cut ends facing the street. Branches cannot be longer than ten feet (10') in length and have a diameter of no larger than six (6) inches.

The Village is divided into four areas for pickup service (see map). Each area receives branch pickup service one time per month.

Area 1	Area 2	Area 3	Area 4
September 6	September 12	September 19	September 26
October 3	October 10	October 17	October 24

Crews try to collect branches as soon as possible. It usually takes more than one day to collect all branches. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact Public Works at 630-736-3850.
